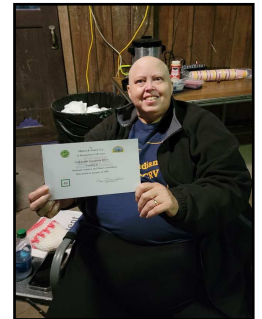

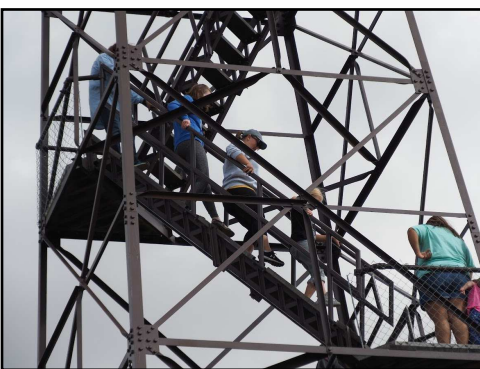
Memories from the Fall Invitational

2021 Indiana Retiree Rally



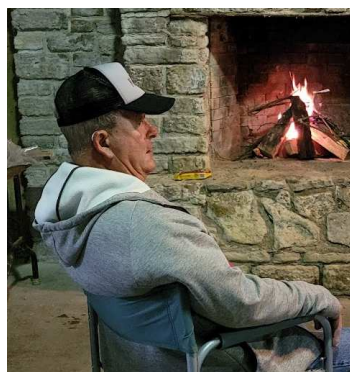

shorter Days: Higher driving risk.

DASAT MOMENT

The daylight hours are getting shorter, and evening becomes a more dangerous time to drive. Shorter days, fatigue, compromised night vision, rush hour and impaired drivers are some of the risks we face when driving at night. Studies have shown that these risks become more pronounced on weekends, with most fatal crashes occurring on Saturday nights.

Depth perception, color recognition and peripheral vision can be compromised in the dark, and the glare of headlights from an oncoming vehicle can temporarily blind a driver. Even with high-beam headlights on, visibility is limited to about 500 feet (250 feet for normal headlights) creating less time to react to something in the road, especially when driving at higher speeds.

What should you do to combat darkness?

- * Aim your headlights correctly, and make sure they're clean.
- * Dim your dashboard
- * Look away from oncoming lights
- * If you wear glasses, make sure they're anti-reflective
- * Clean the windshield to eliminate streaks
- * Slow down to compensate for limited visibility and reduced stopping time

NIGHT VISION is the ability to see well in low-light conditions. As we age, we have greater difficulty seeing at night. A 50-year-old driver may need twice as much light to see as well as a 30-year-old. At age 60 and older, driving can become even more difficult, according to the American Optometric Association.

Some older drivers also may have compromised vision due to cataracts and degenerative eye diseases.

The AOA recommends older drivers:

- * Have annual vision exams
- * Reduce speed
- * Take a driving course; even experienced drivers can benefit from a refresher course, and some of the rules have probably changed
- * Minimize distractions, like talking with passengers or listening to the radio
- * Check with your doctor about side effects of prescription drugs
- * Limit driving to daytime hours if necessary

FATIGUE can be a major factor. A National Sleep Foundation poll says 60% of adults have driven while they were tired, and another 37%, or 103 million people, have fallen asleep at the wheel. Of those, 13% say they fall asleep while driving at least once a month, and 4% say they have caused a crash by falling asleep while driving.

Most crashes or near-misses happen at the times you would expect drivers to be tired: 4 to 6 a.m., midnight to 2 a.m. and 2 to 4 p.m., according to NSF.

Drowsy driving puts everyone on the road at risk. **Losing two hours of sleep has the same effect on driving as having three beers**, and tired drivers are three times more likely to be in a car crash if they are fatigued.

The National Sleep Foundation offers this advice:

- * Get seven or more hours of sleep a night
- * Don't drive if you've been awake for 16 hours or more
- * Stop every two hours to rest
- * Pull over and take a nap if you're drowsy
- * Travel during times you are normally awake

EVENING RUSH HOUR (between 4 and 7 p.m. weekdays) is a dangerous time to drive due to crowded roadways and drivers eager to get home after work. In winter, it's dark during rush hour, compounding an already dangerous driving situation.

How to drive safely during rush hour?

- * Don't be an impatient driver; slow down
- * Stay in your lane and beware of drivers who dart from lane to lane
- * Even though the route may be familiar, don't go on autopilot; stay alert
- * In unfamiliar areas, consult a map before you go and memorize your route
- * Don't touch your phone, eat, drink or do other things that are distracting

Nearly 30 people die every day in crashes that involve a driver **IMPAIRED** by alcohol, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Drivers impaired by prescription medicines and other drugs increase that number significantly. Impaired drivers are most frequently on the road after dark – particularly between the hours of midnight and 3 a.m. on weekends.

While drunk driving has declined by about one-third since 2007, the number of drivers under the influence of drugs has increased. NHTSA also found that the prevalence of THC (found in marijuana) among drivers on weekend nights increased 48% since 2007, from 8.6% of drivers to 12.6%.

STAY ALERT, STAY ALIVE

While we do only one quarter of our driving at night, 50% of traffic deaths happen at night. It doesn't matter whether the road is familiar or not, driving at night is always more dangerous. By taking some extra precautions, we can all contribute to safer nighttime driving.

Recipes worth Sharing!

Veggie Pizza

(As was served at the Fall Invitational)

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 block of cream cheese – room temperature
- 1 packet of ranch dressing mix (powdered)
- ½ C light Miracle Whip or sour cream
- Vegetables of your choice
- Package of flat bread, Nan, or a tube of crescent roll dough

DIRECTIONS:

1. Mix the cream cheese, ranch dressing mix and miracle whip together, cover and chill. This can be done the day before.
2. For the crust: if using crescent roll dough, press it into a lightly greased baking sheet making sure to pinch together the perforations.
3. Bake at temperature suggested on the roll for 8 to 12 minutes or until lightly golden.
4. Let cool completely before adding the ranch spread.
I like to use flat bread for the crust. (they come in a two-pack of rectangles at Aldi's that will fit a pan nicely when trimmed. These are not the flat bread wraps.)
5. When ready to serve, spread the ranch mix over the crust and top with chopped veggies of your choice.

APPLE FILLED SUGAR COOKIES

*Yield: 32 cookies, 3.5 inches in diameter.
Low Sodium*

INGREDIENTS:

- | | |
|------------------------------|---------------------------------|
| 3 1/3 cups all-purpose flour | 1 tsp vanilla |
| 2 tsp baking powder | 1 egg |
| 1/2 tsp salt | 1 can (20 oz) Apple Pie filling |
| 1 cup margarine, softened | 1 tsp apple pie spice |
| 1 1/2 cups sugar | |



DIRECTIONS:

1. Stir together flour, baking powder and salt. Set aside
2. In large mixing bowl, beat together margarine, sugar, vanilla and egg until thoroughly combined.
3. Add flour mixture, stirring until well combined.
4. Cover and refrigerate about 1 hour.
5. While dough is chilling, place apple pie filling in a small bowl. Cut apple slices into small pieces. Stir in pie spice. Set aside.
6. Roll half of dough on floured surface to 1/8 inch thickness. Cut into 3-inch circles. Place half of circles on greased cookie sheets
7. Place 1 Tbsp apple filling in center of each cookie.
8. Cut 1" hole in the center of remaining cookies. Place over apple filling, pressing edges slightly.
9. Bake at 375 degrees F about 12 minutes until edges are lightly browned and cookies are set.
10. Cool on baking sheets. Dust with powdered sugar before serving, if desired.

E. Joan Leedy, 96, Goshen, Indiana, formerly of North Manchester, Indiana, passed away September 26, 2021 at Greencroft Healthcare in Goshen. Born December 8, 1924 in Plainfield, Indiana, Joan was the daughter of the late Cecil and Violet (Stephens) Carnine.


