Recipe worth Sharing!

MAPLE COOKIES WITH MAPLE FROSTING

INGREDIENTS (cookies)

1 cup unsalted butter, softened
2 cups granulated sugar
3 eggs
1 cup buttermilk
1/2 tsp salt
1 tsp vanilla extract
2 tsp maple extract
1 tsp baking soda
1 tsp baking powder
4 1/2 cups all purpose flour

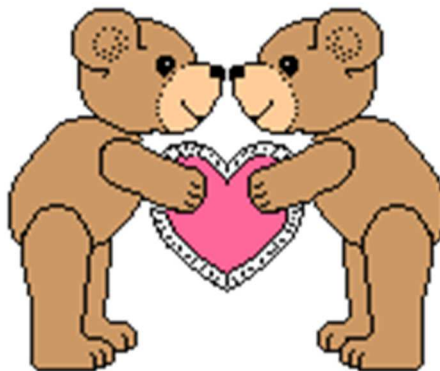
INGREDIENTS (frosting)

1/2 cup unsalted butter
1 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup milk
2 TBSP maple syrup
pinch salt
2 cups powdered sugar

1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a large mixing bowl, cream together butter and sugar until light and fluffy.
2. Add eggs, one at a time, mixing after each.
3. With mixer on low, slowly pour in buttermilk, mix till combined.
4. Add salt, vanilla extract, maple extract, baking soda, and baking powder. Mix well.
5. Add half the flour, mixing until combined. Add rest of flour and mix together.
6. Drop dough by 2 TBSP scoops onto parchment-lined baking sheet, 2" apart. Bake for 6-8 minutes. Cookies will be pale in color. Do not overbake.
7. Allow cookies to cool a few minutes before transferring to a cooling rack. Cool Completely.

FROSTING

1. In a saucepan over medium heat, melt butter and brown sugar. Bring to boil for 2 minutes, whisking constantly.
2. Add milk, maple syrup, and salt. Boil again for 1 minute, whisking continuously.
3. Cool for 15 minutes. Then add powdered sugar, whisking until it reaches a glue-like consistency. If too thick, add milk 1 TBSP at a time.
4. QUICKLY spread over cooled cookies. The icing will thicken as it cools. If necessary, add more milk to spread it easily over each cookie.
5. Allow frosting to set up before storing in a covered container.

We all want to live independently. One of the greatest threats to independent living is right under our feet... actually, it IS our feet (and everything else that keeps us in balance.)

Over 800,000 patients a year are hospitalized because of a fall injury, 300,000 of those with hip fractures. Falls are also the most common cause of traumatic brain injuries.

Certain conditions make one more likely to fall:

- * Lower body weakness
- * Peripheral neuropathy (numbness or pain)
- * Vitamin D Deficiency
- * Certain medications (sedatives, antidepressants, even some over the counter medications).
- * Vision problems
- * Inadequate sleep or poor sleep patterns
- * Previous falls (causes anxiety)
- * Home hazards
 - Broken or uneven steps or flooring
 - Throw rugs or floor clutter
 - Pets
 - Poor lighting

Most falls are caused by a combination of risk factors. The more risk factors that one has, the higher the risk of falling.

HOW TO LIMIT THE RISK OF A FALL

- * Ask your doctor to help evaluate your fall risk.
- * Ask your pharmacist to review your medications (including your over-the-counter meds) to see if they—or their interactions with each other—could make you at a higher risk of fall.
- * Do exercises that increase your strength and balance.
- * Have regular vision checks. Include discussions of the effect of bifocals or progressive lenses on the risk of falls.
- * Evaluate your home:
 - Get rid of clutter and objects you might trip over.
 - Add grab bars in tub or shower and by toilet.
 - use non-slip mats in bathtub and shower floors.
 - Put railings on BOTH sides of stairs
 - Add additional lighting if necessary
 - Keep frequently used items in cabinets that can be reached without the use of step stools.
- * Avoid going barefooted or stocking-footed. Wear shoes or slippers with a non-slip sole even when inside.

- * If you have balance issues or poor sensation in your feet, use a walking stick, cane, or rollator when on uneven ground to assist with balance.
- * Give yourself adequate time to perform tasks, get to destinations, etc. Rushing can be a great hazard for falls.
- * Avoid trying to carry too much at one time. Always have an arm free to balance or support yourself. Keep your line of vision unobstructed by what you are carrying.
- * If you have pets in your home, be extra aware of their location so that they do not cause a trip and fall event.

Statistics have shown that at least one in four people over 65 fall each year. Less than half of these people tell their physician. Falling once doubles the chances of falling again. What appears to be a minor injury can actually be significant, and one injury makes it more likely that a second fall and more severe injury might follow.

An added complication occurs when an older person lives alone and sustains a significant fall. Delayed treatment of a significant injury might occur if there are limitations to being able to contact someone who could help. Establishing some sort of “buddy system” to maintain regular contact with a family or friend could mitigate this eventuality.

Beyond the physical consequences of falls (fractures, pain, future instability), there are social and psychological consequences. Loss of independence and changes to daily routine, the financial cost of hospitalization and the loss of social contacts play a part in diminishing the quality of life. Loss of confidence, increased anxiety, embarrassment from the injury or subsequent disabilities, loss of self-esteem all can result from a fall.

Although we cannot eliminate all causes of falls, being aware of those things that we can do limit the risk may go a long way to prevent the many consequences that can follow. As the old adage states, “An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.”
