Regional Ramblings

As I write, our 2023 Region 3 Regional Campvention in Sabetha, KS and 2023 International Campvention in Richmond, IND are both pleasant memories.

My deepest thanks to Kansas State Directors Earl and Ivalee Vanderhoff, their Committee and Kansas FCRVers, for hosting another successful Regional Campvention! Twenty-six Region 3 families attended the 2023 event. Iowa FCRVers will host the 2024 Regional.

Region 4 hosted the 2023 International Campvention July 9 - 14 at Richmond, IND, known as the "rose city," with many of the Campvention activities and events following a rose theme. The 63rd annual campvention offered many of the familiar campvention activities we've come to expect at International Campventions, along with several new ones. Many campvention participants also toured in and around Richmond during their free time, as well as before or after Campvention.

Region 3 FCRVers received several of numerous national awards presented throughout the week. They included a \$1,500 scholarship (one of three) awarded to Suzy Valderrabano of NE; the 2023 National Conservation Director's Award for Best Chapter Conservation Project, presented to the Aberdeen (SD) Night Owls; a \$500 National Wildlife Grant (one of three) awarded to the Dakota Zoo in Bismarck, ND; a \$25 cash prize awarded to Vern and Pam Failor, KS for the most colorful entry in the site decoration contest; Conner Smith of KS received a 2nd place ribbon on his "Camping Is" poster in the 7-to-8-year old category; Andrew Schultz, MN and Nikki Lucek, MN placed first in the Washer Toss Doubles; Andrew Schultz, MN placed first in the Men's Washer Toss; and Nikki Lucek, MN placed first in the Women's Washer Toss.

Mark your calendars for the 2024 International Campvention, next year to be hosted by Region 5 at Herkimer, NY June 23 - 29, a bit earlier than in recent years, due to limited availability of the venue. The Campvention theme will celebrate the diamond anniversary of FCRV.

I join Carl Fromholzer in encouraging our chapter tech gurus to submit "event recaps" (composed of "280-characters or less" summaries of chapter outings, plus up to 4 photographs) following club, district or state outings. These can be submitted on-line by clicking on "Camping Today" on the FCRV website, then "News," then "submission forms" and finally the "event recap" portal. Your State Director has an e-mailed step-by-step copy of the fairly easy instructions which can be forwarded. Your State Director, Carl, or I can provide assistance, if needed. We need to let people in the Heartland region know that we are out there having fun in the outdoors!

While I'm on the subject of submissions for the various FCRV social platforms, remember to have your club meet sometime this fall or early January (at the latest) to establish your club's 2024 chapter camping schedule. Your State Director needs to submit all chapter camping schedules to the National FCRV Office by February 28, 2024. If someone in your chapter is comfortable submitting the schedule to the Office, please also submit a copy to your State Director and Jan Selby. Posting your schedule to social media is a good member recruitment tool, plus your members will be covered for your season's chapter campouts. In addition, as more chapters submit their camping schedules, the annual insurance premium paid decreases.

One last tech comment: the public FCRV Facebook page is operational and anyone may join. If you haven't checked it out yet, please do so the next time you're checking Facebook posts!

A few changes implemented in recent months include:

- the field manual, which is on-line, has been undergoing revisions during the past 6 months. When finished, it will be reviewed by the Trustees and voted on by the Executive and Advisory Boards;
- volunteers are in the process of digitizing historical items, making them easier to share electronically for special FCRV events;
- four new National Program Directors have recently been appointed; they are the National Adult Activities, Conservation, and Wildlife Directors, along with a new National Historian;
- if National Guard/Reservists are called to active duty, the FCRV family membership can be placed on hold and extended the length of the deployment, until the soldier's return to family and community. Please notify your State Director, so he/she can notify the FCRV Office of the change;
- twenty-year-olds may hold their own individual memberships, provided notification is received in the National Office by the first of the birthday month;
- -numerous changes to the National Scholarship application process will be cited in an upcoming issue of *Camping Today*. Scholarship applications are accepted January through April, to <u>accredited</u> schools only. Scholarships are available to qualified high school seniors for college and trade/tech schools (half scholarship awards), also to adult FCRVers for college and Master's degree programs. Scholarships are also open to grandchildren, if the parents join FCRV for <u>at least 18 months</u>. The grandchild is expected to volunteer for club and state activities/events. One of 2 accompanying recommendations must be from an FCRV member. For questions, contact National Scholarship Chair Deb Swanson or Scholarship Committee Member Jan Selby; and

- National Vice President of Planning & Development Amy deCamp is working tirelessly to secure commercial sponsors and encour-

Chaplain's Comments

As most of you know I am an amateur radio operator or Ham. I first became interested in radio communications in my teenage years. At that time of my life, it was fascinating to me that messages could be sent by a simple tapping of a finger on a table top. Even though most of you have probably never learned what is called morse code, there is one sequence of letters that many of you will recognize. Dit-Dit-Dit Dad-Dah-Dah Dit-Dit-Dit in telegraphic language- or SOS- in any language is known as the international distress call. When it is sent, we know that someone desperately needs help and has resulted in the saving of many lives. Although we have advanced into a more technical world today, the simple sending of this message by whatever means will always have the same meaning.



We know that, throughout the history of mankind, there have also been distress calls sent by those who were lost in the sinful world in which we live. These cries for help do not require an SOS, but may be silent in nature. If only, those who call out know that there is someone there to answer their call. Luke 19:10 tells us:

For the Son of Man came to seek and save the lost

Each of us comes into this world as an innocent child. It's not long before the world begins to indoctrinate us to the point that we can become so lost that the grace offered through Christ cannot find us.

Zucchini Ricotta Fritters

(submitted by Mary Kay Hackett)

Zucchini Ricotta Fritters are a delicious and savory treat, perfect as a side dish, appetizer, or even a light meal. Serve with a squeeze of fresh lemon juice.

Equipment

box grater or food processor frying pan

Ingredients

2 cups grated zucchini (about two medium zucchini)

1 cup ricotta cheese, drained

½ cup all purpose flour

2 large eggs

1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

2 tablespoons green onion, chopped

2 cloves garlic, minced

1 teaspoon baking powder

½ teaspoon kosher salt ¼ teaspoon black pepper olive oil for frying (about a cup lemon wedges for serving, optional Start by grating the zucchini using a box grater or a food processor. After grating, place the zucchini in a clean kitchen towel and squeeze out as much moisture as possible.

In a large mixing bowl, combine the grated and drained zucchini with the ricotta cheese, flour, eggs, grated Parmesan cheese, chopped green onion, minced garlic, baking powder, salt, and black pepper. Mix well until all the ingredients are thoroughly combined.

Heat a generous amount of olive oil in a large nonstick skillet over medium heat. The oil should measure about half an inch deep in the pan.

Using a spoon or scoop, carefully drop portions of the zucchini ricotta mixture into the hot oil, gently flattening each portion with the back of the spoon to form a fritter shape.

Fry the fritters in batches, making sure not to overcrowd the pan. Cook each fritter for about 2-3 minutes on each side or until they are golden brown and crispy.

Once the fritters are cooked, transfer them to a plate lined with paper towels to drain any excess oil. Top with a light sprinkle of kosher salt and squeeze of lemon juice.

Thomas "Tom" H. Paris, age 72 of York, NE died on Saturday, August 12, 2023 at his home, after an unexpected cancer diagnosis. He was born September 13, 1950 in Topeka, KS to Henry and Virginia (Seward) Paris. He graduated from high school in 1969 in Peublo, CO.

In 1972, Tom moved to Nebraska and was a cook at Cattlemen's in Kearney, NE. Then in 1974, he moved to Lexington and bought Little Paris Café, where he met his future wife, Deborah Kneeland.

Through the years he owned Little Paris Café, TP Boot Repair, and Little Paris Family Restaurant. He also was a manager at Sav-A-Lot Deli and worked at VVS. In 2012, they relocated to York, NE and was a custodian at York Elementary School until his retirement in 2020.


Tom was married to Deborah on July 29, 1976 in Ravenna, NE. They were married for 47 years and they had two children: Matthew and Kayla.
