What a year this is for those who appreciate nature, as we campers are wont to do! After the magnificent solar eclipse on April 8, we are now awaiting a phenomenon that has not happened since 1908!!! Here is some information about the great Cicada double emergence of 2024.


In 1803, Thomas Jefferson was president of the United States. The Louisiana Purchase acquired 530,000,000 acres from France for a whopping \$15 million, almost doubling the size of the fledgling country. Britain declared war on France, The Napoleonic Wars, which would last a decade. And in 1803, two broods of periodic Cicadas matured en mass and emerged for their brief lives above the terrain.

Why is that important? Because for the first time since 1803, that dual emergence is going to happen again in May and June of 2024. Indiana will have some impact by this emergence, though many of us will not be affected. Our neighbors in Illinois will experience some of the most active emergences from both broods.

Annual Cicadas are much less dramatic because of their smaller numbers. The 17-year Cicadas (Brood XIII) dwell mainly in Wisconsin, Iowa, and Illinois. The 13-year Cicadas (Brood XIX) mainly live in the southeast and Midwest. Their overlapping state is Illinois

Prior to their emergence, the Cicadas pass through five juvenile stages about 8 feet underground as they feed on plant roots. They tunnel up to about 2 feet underground to feed on roots throughout their subterranean life. Although their synchronized emergences are predictable, the way they communicate to emerge together is still being studied. It may relate to an internal clock that allows them to sense the passage of time through the changes in the nutri-

Lawn to view with PRIDE, not Pain

A well groomed yard is a thing of beauty, especially in the springtime, when the world is emerging from the monochromatic dullness of the winter. The price of lawncare includes a potentially devastating cost, however. In the United States, of 80,000 lawn mower accidents yearly, nearly 6,400 occur among children younger than 18 years of age. Children under the age of 14 and adults over the age of 44 are the most commonly affected by lawn mower accidents. Boys make up 82% of all injuries.

The most common injuries are cuts to the hands and feet, which can easily get past the blade protectors. These cuts may be superficial, but can go deeper into the muscle, ligaments, tendons, and bones. Lawnmowers account for 9% of traumatic amputations in children, and 5% of lawn mower injuries involve severe burns. 2.6% of injuries occurring when operating or being near a running lawnmower lead to death.

The financial burden in the US is estimated at 136 million dollars, with the average cost *per patient* being \$37,000.

Common causes of lawn mower accidents include objects being thrown by the mower blade, loss of control or rollover, stepping on or getting caught in the spinning blade, and improper use of the mower. Burns result from coming into contact with the external components of the motor.

How do the injuries happen? ADULTS:

- Carelessness when starting the mower or adjusting the blades.
- Burns from touching the hot frame of the mower or fires from careless refilling of the tank.
- Injuries from contact with the blades because of slips and falls on wet grass or trying to move objects in the way of the mower without shutting the mower down.
- Attempting to mow steep hills or uneven ground, causing the mower to overturn.
- Inadequate safety equipment.

CHILDREN:

- Young children can fall or slip into the operating mower blade while playing and running nearby.
- Children can be injured while operating the mower when they are too young to do so or when young children fall off a mower while riding with an adult.
- Children can be injured when mowers are placed into reverse and the operator is not aware that a child is behind them.
- Rocks or other objects can be thrown by the

mower, striking a child,: even from a distance.

To reduce the risk of mower accidents,

- Wear protective gear (gloves, long pants, eye protection, hearing protection.)
- Wear sturdy shoes (not sandals, flip-flops, sneakers)
- Maintain the mower properly. Adults should adjust the blade settings, set the wheel height, dislodge debris. Any maintenance should be done with the mower off and the spark plug disconnected.
- Use only a power mower with a control that stops the mower if the handle is let go, and be certain this control is never disconnected.
- ◆ Start and refuel mowers outdoors, not in a garage or shed. Mowers should be refueled with the motor turned off and cool.
- Do not allow children younger than 16 to use ride -on mowers. Do not allow children younger than 12 to use walk-behind mowers.
- Do not allow children to ride on riding lawnmowers, even with an adult operating the mower.
- Keep children well away from the mowing area.
- Mow only in good weather conditions. (The leading cause of foot injuries with power mowers is slipping on rain-soaked grass).
- Avoid mowing on slopes that are too steep.
- Before mowing, pick up objects from the lawn (stones, toys, lawn furniture.) Do not try to move these objects while the mower is in operation.
- If something becomes lodged in the blades, turn off the mower and disconnect the spark plugs. Remove the obstruction with some sort of tool. Do not use hand or fingers to dislodge the object, even when wearing gloves. It the mower stalls because of vines or other vine-like objects winding around the blade, do not just pull the vines out, as that might reengage the blades and pull the hand back into the blade mechanism.

Other precautions should also be considered: dangers exist in using weed eaters or hedge trimmers, encountering hornets' nests or ground bees, contacts with lawn chemicals or weed controllers, uneven ground causing falls or ankle injuries, overheating or dehydration.

As in all things, an ounce of precaution is better than a pound of cure. The result is a beautiful lawn that you could be proud of!



ents that they eat. Some studies have shown the emergence may relate to ground temperature. They usually emerge when the ground temperature is 64 degrees at 8 inches below the surface.


Once the Cicadas emerge, the time clock is activated for them to sing (the males make noise through membranes on their abdomens), mate, lay eggs and die. Underground, they are relatively safe from predators, but once they emerge they are fair game for almost every animal to eat, particularly birds. By emerging in large numbers (billions, or as in this year with two broods emerging, trillions), their sheer numbers make it more likely that their colonies will survive.

Cicadas are not dangerous to humans or animals. In fact, their life cycles provide a valuable food source for birds and other predators, aerate lawns and improve water filtration into the ground as they create burrows, and add nutrients to the soil as they decompose.

The life cycle of the CICADA is depicted on the poster from the National Museum of Natural History seen on page 1. What actually emerges from the ground are the nymphs, who are encased in an exoskeleton. After emerging, they will find a vertical surface on which to affix themselves as they shed the exoskeleton. Those will be quite obvious, but they are totally empty. The males begin their mating song (which is the loud noise that we hear) by activating a membrane on their abdomens. After mating, the female lays her eggs in tiny slits that she has created in the bark of trees. The trees are not injured by this. When the eggs hatch, the nymphs feed temporarily on the sap of the trees, fall to the ground, dig holes and start their 13-17 year development in the ground.

Pets or other animals can eat the Cicadas in any of their life stages, though the exoskeletons may irritate their GI tracts. Though not many take advantage of it, humans can also eat the Cicadas. See the recipe page of this CHATTER for an interesting recipe! One person reported that the Cicada has a similar taste to asparagus.


As with the Eclipse, only a select number of individuals will have the opportunity of experiencing this historic event in its fullness. Still, it is interesting to learn more about our fascinating world!


Caramel O's Snack

INGREDIENTS

- 12 cups CHheerios
- 1 cup packed brown sugar 1/2 C butter or margarine
- 1/4 c light corn syrup
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp baking soda

DIRECTIONS

- Heat oven to 250 degrees.
- In large ungreased bowl or pan, measure cereal.
- In 1-quart saucepan, heat brown sugar, butter, corn syrup and salt to boiling, stirring constantly. Cook over medium heat for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally.
- Remove from heat. Stir in soda until foamy. Pour over cereal, stirring until evenly coated. (optional: add peanuts or pecans to mixture)
- Divide between 2 ungreased 13 x 9 pans.
- Bake for 1 hour, stirring every 20 minutes.
- Cool and store in airtight container.





INGREDIENTS:

- 1 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 8 tbsp (1 stick) unsalted butter, cold, cubed
- 2 cups grated cheddar or pepper jack cheese
- 2 eggs, room temperature, slightly beaten
- 1/2 cup finely chopped jalapeno peppers (I use Mezzetta brand "Tamed" style Jalapeno peppers)
- 1/4 c Jalapeno juice from the jar.

DIRECTIONS:

- Combine flour, salt, and baking powder in a large bowl. Cut in butter with a pastry cutter or 2 forks until finely crumbly.
- Stir in beaten egg.
- Add cheese and chopped jalapeno. Dough will be very dry.
- Stir in jalapeno juce just until combined.
- Cover and refrigerate for one hour.
- 6. Preheat oven to 400 degrees.
- 7. Use large cookie scoop to measure out biscuits, placing on lined or greased cookie sheet.
- Bakef or 14-18 minutes until biscuits are just turning brown.
- Cool on pan for 5 minutes, then transfer to wire rack to cool completely before serving.
