- \* Provide educational opportunities and share our lived experiences, both individually and communally, in our efforts to live in right relationship within the Earth Community.

August is National Immunization Awareness Month (NIAM). This annual observance highlights the importance of getting recommended vaccines throughout your life. We know the COVID-19 pandemic has impacted all aspects of life, including your ability to attend important appointments and receive routine vaccinations.

Many people think that so-called natural immunity or "herd immunity" will keep them safe, or that many of the diseases for which we immunize don't exist anymore or can be easily treated if they are acquired. This is not true.

Some diseases are very rare, but outbreaks do occur throughout the world. With more international travel and with the number of new immigrants coming into our country, the possibility of encountering some of these less prevalent infections increases.

Vaccination is much safer than trying to develop natural immunity by getting the disease. Some diseases can have lasting damaging effects on the body. Being vaccinated against that disease is less likely to produce long lasting deleterious effects.

One argument some give against getting vaccines is that vaccines can make you sick or overload your immune system. Vaccines are commonly made using small amounts of weakened or dead germs. As such, they cannot cause an active disease, though it is possible to get side effects from the injections (local soreness or mild symptoms related to the activation of the immune system.) Vaccines spark the immune system to recognize disease-causing germs, so that it can eliminate them before they make you sick.

Vaccine schedules are fairly complex, depending on age, medical conditions, and previous protection. NIAM is a good time to talk to your doctor, nurse, or healthcare provider to ensure you and your family are protected against serious diseases by getting caught up on routine vaccinations. Children require a larger number of vaccines, since their immune systems are just developing. Their pediatrician or family doctor can advise on the best schedule to provide them with the most current and essential coverage.

On the other end of the spectrum, older adults are more susceptible to the long-term effects of various illnesses. There are six vaccines that should be considered Speak with your doctor or pharmacist to determine what is most appropriate for you.



The six vaccines of concern for older adults are:

COVID-19 Flu RSV Pneumonia (Pneumococcal) Tdap Shingles

### COVID-19

Disease: Respiratory disease causing fever, cough, shortness of breath.

Risk: Older adults are most at risk for serious illness and death.

Vaccine: reduces risk of getting disease or being hospitalized if disease occurs. CDC offers guidelines for remaining up-to-date.

### **FLU (INFLUENZA)**

Disease: fever, chills, sore throat, stuffy nose, headache, muscle aches.

Risk: Older adults are at higher risk for complications such as pneumonia.

Vaccine: Recommended yearly for all over 6 months old. A higher-dose vaccine is available for those 65 and over. Vaccine should ideally be received before the end of October to protect during the flu season (December and January) but may be effected even if given later.

### RSV (Respiratory Syncytial virus)

Disease: cold like symptoms. Most common in the fall and winter months.

Risk: Older adults have a higher risk of severe symptoms, possibly life-threatening.

Vaccine: Recommended for those 75 years old and over, and ages 60-74 with other health issues. This is not a yearly vaccine at this time. Studies show that the immunity lasts about 2 years. Studies of duration are still in process.

### PNEUMONIA (Pneumococcal)

Disease: Pneumococcal pneumonia. Lung infection.

Risk: Older adults are at higher risk for becoming very sick or dying from this infection.

Vaccine: Recommended for those 65 and over.

There are multiple forms of the vaccine. It does



# Recipes Worth Sharing



### PEACH DUMP CAKE

### **INGREDIENTS**

- \* 32 ounce can of peaches in heavy syrup
- \* 1 package yellow cake mix
- \* 1/2 cup butter
- \* 1/2 tsp ground cinnamon (or to taste)

### **DIRECTIONS**

- 1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees.
- 2. Empty peaches into a 9 x 13 baking dish.
- 3. Cover peaches with dry cake mix. Press down firmly.
- 4. Cut or grate butter into small pieces and scatter on top of cake mix. Do not mix the butter into the dry cake mix. Sprinkle top with cinnamon.
- 5. Bake in the preheated oven until the top of the cake is golden brown (about 45 minutes).
- 6. Serve warm or cold.

### AIR FRYER EGGPLANT

### **INGREDIENTS**

- \* Large eggplant (1 pound)
- \* 3/4 tsp Kosher Salt (divided)
- \* 2 tbsp avocado, vegetable, or olive oil
- \* 1 tsp. Italian seasoning
- \* 1 tsp. garlic powder
- \* 1 tsp paprika

### **DIRECTIONS**

- 1. Cut eggplant into 1-inch cubes. (It is not necessary to peel the eggplant.)
- 2. Line a baking sheet with paper towels. Place eggplant on towels and sprinkle with 1/2 tsp. salt, covering all sides of the cubes. Rest for 15 minutes, then pat the surface dry to absorb the moisture.
- 3. In a large bowl, mix oil and seasonings Toss in the eggplant until well coated.
- 4. Preheat air fryer to 400 degrees F.
- 5. Place the eggplant in an even layer, avoiding overcrowding.
- 6. Air fry for 12 minutes, shaking the basket after 6 minutes.



Transfer to a plate or bowl. If desired, sprinkle with chopped parsley and a squeeze of lemon juice.

Store in airtight container for up to 3 days. Reheat in the air fryer for 2 minutes at 400 degrees F. Yield: 2 cups

not cover other forms of pneumonia, only Pneumococcal. For most adults, a single dose of the vaccine is indicated after age 65. (Children under 5 years are also vaccinated but with more frequent injections.

### **Tdap or Td (Tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis)** Disease:

Tetanus: caused by bacteria found in soil, dust, and manure. Enters the body through a deep cut or burn.

Diphtheria: Serious disease that can affect the tonsils, throat, nose or skin. Can spread from person to person.

Pertussis (whooping cough): Uncontrollable violent coughing fits that make it hard to breathe. Spreads from person to person, and is especially dangerous for newborns.

Risk: Dangerous at any age.

Vaccine: Given as a series in children, but booster shots needed every 10 years. Should be up-to-date especially when anticipating contact with infants.

### **SHINGLES**

Disease: Caused by the same virus as chickenpox, the virus remains in the body. Reactivation affects specific nerves, causing burning, shooting pain, tingling, itching and rash. Pain can remain for long times after the rash is gone.

Risk: Debilitating pain, post-herpetic pain
Vaccine: Given in two doses to those over 50 years
old. Those immunized by the older vaccine
(Zostavax) should be reimmunized with the newer
form (Shingrix) Vaccine is indicated even with a
previous history of Shingles.

In summary, vaccines are generally very safe, and they can help keep you from getting serious or lifethreatening diseases. The most common side effects are generally mild, and may include pain, swelling or redness where the vaccine was given.

Before getting any vaccine, talk with the doctor or pharmacist about your health history, including past illnesses and treatments, as well as any allergies.

It's a good idea to keep your own vaccination record, listing the types and dates of your shots, along with any side effects or problems.


