Campvention Poster Awards

Every four years we have the opportunity to evaluate and either endorse or replace the leadership in our country. Along with that privilege (and it is a privilege that not all countries afford their citizens) is the fact that election stress is a distinct reality. The constant barrage from the news and social media, the polarization that happens when people exercise their right to formulate opinions and convictions, the differing situations that shape our perceived needs and desires all create a hot soup that can result in anxiety, fractured relationships, and general disruption of one's state of peace.

But it doesn't have to be that way! What are things you can do to prevent and manage the stress that accompanies one of the most important events of a democratic society?

MAINTAIN YOUR DAILY WELLNESS HABITS.

- Stick to your normal sleep routine.
- Develop a routine for regular physical exercise.
- Eat a balanced diet, avoiding excesses of caffeine, alcohol, sugar.

FOCUS ON WHAT YOU CAN CONTROL.

- Decide on your desired level of involvement. If you want to be very involved, you can volunteer for a candidate or work at a polling center.
- If that creates anxiety or other negative feelings, then it is fine to avoid that extra stress.

SET BOUNDARIES

- Set limits to your exposure to political news and social media. What you hear in 30 minutes does not change if you are exposed to it for 12 hours. Be informed, but not obsessed.
- If a conversation becomes overly heated or threatening, feel free to walk away from the situation. Arguing rarely changes anyone else's mind.
- Pre-establish a plan to "defuse" when you start feeling anxious or overwhelmed. Retreat to a quiet place, contemplate things you are grateful for, engage in a relaxing hobby, read a nonpolitical book.

REMEMBER THE GOLDEN RULE

- Recognize that every person has the right to his or her opinion, even if it differs from your own.
- Remain civil and respectful. Do not villainize another person because they disagree with you.
- Realize that you can love someone, especially family and friends, even if they disagree with

you. Relationships are built on so much more than political views. Viewpoints are a part of who a person is, but they do not define the value of that person.

CHOOSE YOUR BATTLES WISELY

- Before you engage in a discussion/debate with someone who has an opinion contrary to yours, consider what your goal is. Do you think you will change the other person's mind or get them to admit that you are right? That seldom happens.
- Do you need to defend yourself to maintain your self respect?
- Do you need to correct perceived injustice or unfairness?
- Judge the temperature of the encounter. Is it a conversation or an argument. When tempers flair, reason often goes out the window and anything productive or meaningful is lost.
- Try to remain open-minded. Ask yourself, "What can I learn from this person, even if I do not agree with him/her?"

PREPARE YOURSELF

- If you are eligible to vote, be an informed voter. Recognize that much of the "news" falls into the category of "opinion." Seek to know the positions of the candidates in those areas that are most meaningful for you. Disregard, as much as possible, the inevitable name-calling, mudslinging, and histrionics.
- Have a plan for election night. Results might not be available quickly, and it might be more productive to plan something else to do other than be glued to the TV. Maybe a good movie or a night out with supportive friends is a better option.
- Recognize that in the results of every election one side will be elated and one defeated. Be kind to yourself. Be kind to others. Call upon your inner strength, your faith, and the resilience that has brought you to this moment to remain optimistic and positive.

When all is said and done, after the elections are over we will return to our personal lives, and most of what we feared and fretted about will not happen. We may not be happy about the results, but we will learn to live with them, at least for the next four years.

More giving recognized...

Last month the CHATTER recognized some of the Wildlife Program grants awarded to Indiana non-profit organizations who care for and educate through services to our animal companions. This month we expand on that recognition by highlighting two more Hoosier charities.

Macey & I were honored to visit Utopia Wildlife Rehabilitators August 17th to present the FCRV wildlife grant by Kathy Hershey and Dr. Melissa Newcomb. Kathy had been a keeper and technician at the Indianapolis Zoo Hospital, and Dr. Newcomb did a wildlife internship at Clinic for Rehabilitation of Wildlife (CROW) on Sanibel Island, Florida.

In the summer of 2002, West Nile Virus appeared in Indiana, and many birds, particularly raptors, were severely affected. Local animal control authorities and conservation officers were unable to handle the crisis and asked Hershey and Newcomb to get the required permits to treat the sick birds. Utopia has treated thousands of reptiles, birds, mammals, and birds of prey since 2002.

Utopia was incorporated and became a 501(c)(3) nonprofit in 2004. At that time, Hershey and Newcomb obtained the necessary State and Federal permits for non-releasable birds and animals to be used for educational programs. Utopia's wildlife programs educate and entertain over 10,000 people annually, and they travel with their animals to schools, libraries, nature centers, museums, festivals, hospi-

tals, and rehabilitation centers. They frequently appear on television and in local newspapers.

The aim is to raise public awareness of native Indiana wildlife and encourage respect and understanding of all creatures. Utopia sits on the edg e of smalltown Hope Indiana. Kathy & her husband live on the property where Utopia is located.

They are the most dedicated and interesting people I have met in some time. Multiple Boy/Eagle Scout projects have been completed for Utopia and volunteers are always welcome. Not one person associated with Utopia is paid, they all volunteer their time and resources to help Indiana wildlife.

The name Utopia actually came about as an acronym. Up To Our Posterior In Animals, because they were so busy during the West Nile time. As Utopia also means "a state of bliss" it fits perfectly to the animals they rescue. Utopia truly provides a place of bliss where they can heal, grow, and return to nature when they are ready.

On July 16, 2024, at the parking lot of the Limberlost Bird Sanctuary, Ed & Angie Shaneyfelt (on the left side of the picture to the left) presented a \$1,000 donation check from the National Campers Hikers to three board members of Friends of the Limberlost (left-to-right—Bill Hubbard, Melissa Fey, and Jackie Caffee). The donation will be used to support any project that improves the Limberlost Bird Sanctuary or enhances the visitor experience at this 40-acre nature preserve, located in Jay County, IN.

The Friends of the Limberlost is a 501(c)3 not-for-profit that was incorporated in 1994. The Friends assist the Indiana State Museum with the operation and preservation of Limberlost State Historic Site—which features the Limberlost Cabin (pictured to the left). This log home was built in 1895 for Indiana author and nature photographer, Gene Stratton-Porter, who lived in the home from 1895 to 1913. She made the Limberlost Swamp famous in her popular books, Freckles and A Girl of the Limberlost, published in 1904 and 1909, respectively.

The Limberlost Swamp was a 13,000-acre wetland that was almost completely ditched, drained, and de-forested by the late 1800s and early 1900s as early settlers sought to capitalize on the demand for timber and oil—two very abundant natural resources found in the Limberlost.

Today, Gene Stratton-Porter's home (the 14-room Limberlost Cabin) is a state historic site visited by thousands of tourists and school children every year.

In addition, nearly 1,800 acres of the Limberlost Swamp have been restored, and visitors can take advantage of self-guided nature trails (like the ones at the Bird Sanctuary). Visitors can also enjoy pre-scheduled guided hikes conducted by the Limberlost naturalist on trails maintained by the Indiana Department of Natural Resources Division of Nature Preserves with financial and volunteer assistance from Friends of the Limberlost.

The Friends are so grateful for the \$1,000 donation made by the National Campers Hikers, presented by the Shaneyfelts. We hope it's the first of many donations to be made by your organization to benefit the Limberlost.

Discord

Discord

National and our leadership has moved on from using Zoom as our go to product for Video Communication and moved over to using Discord. Along with using Discord as our main source of video communication comes a slew of other benefits that Zoom did not allow.

Discord is a FREE social media platform that allows users to communicate in real time using text, voice, and video through public or private servers. You can find servers for all types of hobbies, from anything like knitting, bee keeping, video games, or sports, to things that FCRV exhibits like camping, RVing, wildlife and conservation

Your trustees, National Office and 'Camping Today' team have been using it for the last few months to test it out and get experience with using its features before we opened our server up to membership and the general public.

Discord, while giving us a platform for our leadership and members to communicate also comes with a MUCH needed benefit of moving FCRV into spaces used by younger generations. Discord has 3 options for using its services. Those options are a phone app, an app for pc/mac, or you can even access it right through a web browser. So it makes communication VERY easy and FAST with how accessible it is compared to Zoom.

Using Discord requires creating an account for it.

Please make sure to take measures to log the name and password you create to reference logging back into it whenever needed. Also please keep in mind that the minimum age to create a Discord account is 13 years of age.
